However, some people don't know where to get employed or how. The following are a few tips and tricks that my friends have told me to start making some money!

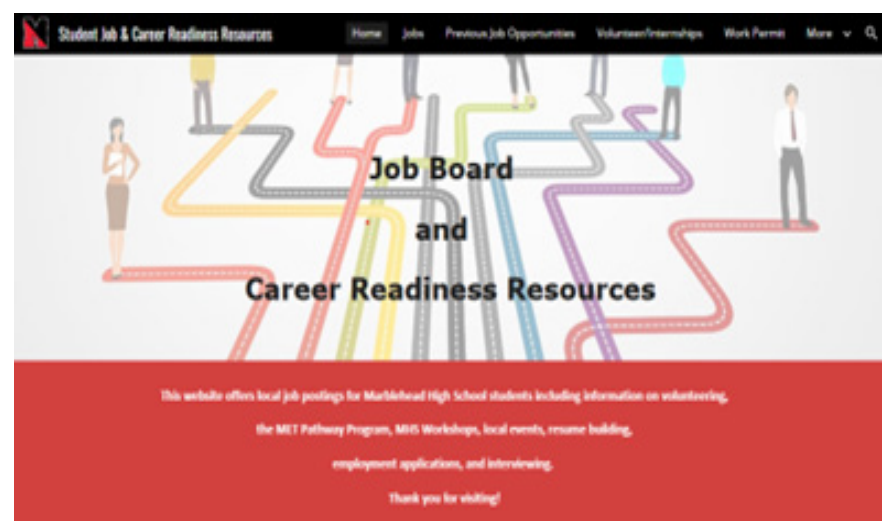
Make a résumé. A résumé is basically a professional summary of jobs that you have worked in the past. For instance, you could write on your résumé that you have been a camp counselor or a CIT at a summer camp and worked with little kids. This could show your new employer you are good under pressure and can take instructions from those who are higher up.

Meet the boss in person. A great way to make a connection to a workplace is to meet the person who runs the place! You can go to the place of work and see if there are any business

cards to take, or introduce yourself to an employee. After speaking with someone in person, you can email them using the address on the business card.

Look online to see if a place is hiring. Some places downtown have links on their websites for the employment process. This will typically have directions on how to start applying for a job there. For example, the website of The Beacon has a tab that says "Employment Opportunities," where you can find information about working there.

The school year is almost at a close, so now is the ideal time to start looking for places to work. College students will also be coming back for the summer and taking job slots. Great first job opportunities are hostessing, bussing, camp counseling, and working in retail. Starting in the workforce early on will help benefit you with connections that can impact you later in life.
